Learning Outcomes

Course Objectives

- Uses a variety of strategies to prepare for writing, such as brainstorming, making lists, mapping, outlining, grouping related ideas, using graphic organizers, and taking notes.
- Creates a single paragraph with clear sentences that include a topic sentence, simple supporting facts and details, and a concluding sentence.
- Create various modes of writing formal and informal
- Uses the writing process – prewriting, drafting, revising, editing, and publishing successive versions.
- Uses conventions of punctuation correctly, including semicolons, colons, ellipses, hyphens, and dashes.
- Edits and proofreads one's own writing, as well as that of others, using the writing conventions, and, for example, an editing checklist or list of rules with specific examples of corrections of specific errors.
- Read closely to determine what the text says explicitly and to make logical inferences from it; cite specific textual evidence when writing or speaking to support conclusions drawn from the text
- Read and comprehend complex literary and informational texts independently and proficiently

In addition to the course hours in the classroom, the expectation for work completion outside of class includes approximately 1-2 hours. Activities will include: reading and journal writing.
